Minimalism

The term Minimalism refers to a movement in art, design, photography and other visual arts. The main foundation of Minimalism is to eliminate all non-essential aspects of the work. Any part or component of the work which does not characterise the essence, form or identity of the subject is excluded.

Minimalism is a modern movement based on ancient principles. The movement is influenced by Japanese traditions, architecture and design among other ideas. It draws on religious traditions which sought to cleanse mind and body of temptation and impulsive influences and to seek purity.

In modern photography the movement has strong themes consistent with 'de-cluttering' images so that the theme can be emphasised by the strength of the main subject (or object) of the picture. Essentially, a minimalist photographer will try to exclude anything that interferes with the message of the image or distracts the viewer from that message. The theme is often continued in postprocessing of the shot where un-necessary elements may be removed using an image editor.

I was asked to give a "definition" of minimalist photography and although I think that Paddy can come up with a more accurate version, I will briefly attempt to give my interpretation from my own experience.

I have consulted my comprehensive private photo library of books and could not find a single reference to minimalist photography. Not even 'The Visual Experience' by Hobbs & Salome, discussing various art movements gave a reference to this type of photography.

Another excellent publication by Liz Wells, 'Photography: A critical Introduction', has also no reference to minimalist photography.

My other most important reference ie: 'The Focal Encyclopedia of Photography', also has no reference, so I did what I do not like to do for reference and that is the internet. But even with the internet I will only consult reference material which I think is worthwhile, so here is what I have found briefly, including the source.

Minimalist is a style or technique (as in music, literature, or design) that is characterized by extreme spareness and simplicity. This is according to the Mirriam -Webster dictionary. Wikipedia has the following comment about minimalism: The term minimalist often colloquially refers to anything that is spare or stripped to its essentials.

The Encyclopedia Britannica mentions the origin: Minimalism, chiefly American movement in the visual arts and music originating in New York City in the late 1960s and characterized by extreme simplicity of form and a literal, objective approach.

So hopefully HPS members can work with this information.

But be aware, as in most genres of photography there are overlaps and grey areas. Often photographers produce an abstraction or abstract image and consider that to be minimalist, which to my interpretation of the image is rather an abstract and not minimalist. After studying a few examples especially available on the world wide web, I have found a clear difference.

So without too much restriction and definitions, give it a go and see what others (and judges) think.

ARE YOU A PHOTOGRAPHER


Are you a photographer? Does this sound like anyone you know?
