TECHNICAL TATTLE

Backlighting (also kicker or rim lighting) relates to a design of lighting where the <u>keylight</u>, or one of the main lights, is placed facing the camera with the subject placed between them. The effect is to produce a glow or rim on the edges of the subject at the back. The glow effect at the back leaves the rest of the subject in shadow, or weakened light.

Often used in conjunction with other lights backlighting emphasises depth in the subject. It also creates a rim light around the edge of the subject that separates it from the background. This separation is very important where the subject may be dark and the background may be dark too. In that case, the subject can easily merge into the background without the backlighting.

Backlighting can be created by artificial light. In this case the backlighting is directed onto the back of the subject from one or more lights dedicated for that purpose. These lights are a part of the overall scheme of lighting in the scene.

Backlighting can be created using natural light. The subject is placed so that sunlight falls on the back creating a rim or backlighting effect. This is particularly useful where bright light on the front of a subject would over brighten it in the final image. So the subject is placed with the back to the sun and slightly angled to create the rim light. In this case <u>fill flash</u> at low power may be used, or other lighting, to create the correct exposure for the front of the subject. The natural backlighting on the subject is then used to separate the subject from the background scene.

As mentioned at the meeting on Wednesday we are changing the way in which digital images will be entered for competitions. Digital images being entered for competition evenings are no longer to be sent in by email; instead you will submit them online via the Photo Vault Online website as explained at <u>Submit digital images for competition evenings</u>, which for convenience I am repeating here.

You may enter three digital images for competition evenings; either two images in 'Set Subject' and one image in 'Open', or one image in 'Set Subject' and two images in 'Open'. Find the set subject topic for the competition in the newsletter or programme. Submit your competition entries to the Helderberg Photographic Society event on the Photo Vault Online website as described in the attached document.

As you will need to join the Photo Vault Online website and then request to join the Helderberg Photographic Society club on the site before you will be able to submit your entries, it's important to enter well before the closing date on your first time, in case there are any delays or problems.

Briefly you will need to do the following to enter:

- 1. Visit Photo Vault Online and Login or Register if you haven't yet done so.
- 2. If you haven't yet joined HPS on Photo Vault Online, select **My Clubs** then **Join a Club**. Find **Helderberg Photographic Society** in the list and click **Request Join** next to it. The site will send me an email and I will need to approve your request.
  Once I have done so you will receive an email acknowledging this.
- 3. When you have registered and joined the club you will be able to select **My Clubs** then **My Club Entries**. A list of the club competitions you can enter will be displayed. Select **Enter here** next to **Helderberg Photographic Society** and you will be shown the entry form. Fill it in making sure that the correct club is selected and enter the number of categories you are entering; 1 or 2 depending on whether you are entering both set subject on open categories, or just one of them. You will then be able to upload new images for each category or select ones you have already uploaded. Once you have uploaded them select **Finalise My Entry**. You will receive an email confirming your entry.

Note that it is only competition entries that will be submitted this way; black and white digital images must continue to be sent by email as before.


- Q2 Is photography 100% therapeutic for you or are there moments when it stresses you?

Q5 Do you subscribe to any photographic magazines/listings. If yes, any one in particular you would recommend?
 I subscribe to Art Times - but probably not for photography. Because of my membership, I also receive PSSA's 'Image'. Should you want to see

my membership, I also receive PSSA's 'Image'. Should you want to see technically correct and 'beautiful' images, all within the PSSA Rules, this is it. Our own Steve Crane's 'photo links' are superb for all the needs of photographers.



What most attracts you to a photographic opportunity : colour, shapes, line, texture, story, etc.

I attended a number of workshops with Freeman Paterson. He taught me to see and not just look. Once I started to see, all of the above elements of visual design, became relevant. I am mostly intrigued by lines. The narrative I try to portray in an image, can often be different to the narrative the viewer reads. Titles sometimes help, but can also be very confusing. I often have my own narrative on other photographer's images, but am surprised when he/she explains their narrative.

Q7 What advice would you give someone just starting out in photography, in order that they gain confidence and find their niche?

'Get to know your camera'. I learnt a lot by reading up on photography. Page through articles on the old masters and especially new generation photographers - Cartier-Bresson, Ansel Adams, Man Ray, Alfred Stieglitz, Annie Liebovitz, Andreas Gursky, Valda Bailey, Chris Friel, Grant Legassick, etc. Be adventurous, try new 'things' and see which niche you would like to fit into. Discuss your images with groups, family, friends, and others who would give you true and honest, positive and negative criticism. Grow and learn from your fellow members. Enter and partake in club evenings. Do not try and please the judge. Judging is subjective. If you are happy with your image that scored 17, so be it.

- Q8 In your whole portfolio, more wildlife or people, and why do you think this is?

  Most of my 'people images' are 'stolen' off the street or public places. Flashes and posed images are not for me. I enjoy making landscape images more. Initially I did a lot of wildlife photography but how many shots can you take of a lazy male lion or birds on thirds? Nowadays I aim to be more creative with my wildlife shots. Not always successful when entered at club evenings, but I enjoy making them.
- Q9 Your Flickr account contains an album 'graveyards' . Is it (for example) merely an interest in the symbolism of the stones, or do you think you are preserving history that may face desecration at some stage in life?

We love traveling and graveyards fascinate me - probably because most European and East European nations look after the graves so well. Lots of freshly cut flowers. The different stories those tombstones and their embellishments portray. I certainly won't claim a piece of ground after death, much rather be part of Nossob dust.

Q10 Apart from being a member of the HPS, any other photographic association you are affiliated to, and the benefits of this membership?

In 2012 I was invited by Antenie to join a group of 9 individuals with a goal to be more creative in photography. Via monthly get-togethers, outings, studying books, knowledge from the group, being a great soundboard on presented images, I keep my motivation and enthusiasm for photography. I hold two fellowships with PSSA - one in colour slides and the other in audiovisuals. I personally think that PSSA, the official body representing photographers in South Africa, is a good society for photographers to belong to, for many obvious reasons, but I do not always agree with their stringent rules, that may curb and dampen creativity. I also get WhatsApp messages from the VisLit group - this to me is the way to go. My wish is still to attend some of these meetings.
