Visual Literacy



VisLit continues to strive and thrive and our last meeting was all about getting it right, judging our own photos, and the challenge of producing images of high impact. An almost impossible task to accomplish as stated by one of the group members, because "by the time I submit the picture for competition, I have done all I can to make it perfect." Point taken.

Why do we take photos? Is it for the judges or is it for ourselves? How good are we really? Are we able to see and capture a beautiful artistic photo or do we have to resort to post-production to make it happen? I wanted to ask "what kind of images do we display at home, what adorns our own walls?" but we ran out of time.

We soon discovered that we all see and interpret the same image in different ways. We also discovered that by judging our own pictures in the group and by adding an accompanying explanation the initial judgement of the other members suddenly started to change, as the intention justified the image as it stood. Further debate also showed that different photographers approach the same image in different ways. The same photo would be manipulated differently for instance. Someone would favour a crop, showing 'this part' of the image, while someone else would favour a complete part of the same image. The final image would be completely different.

Judges, when faced with an image, know nothing of the intention or the emotional response of the photographer. All they know (like blinkers) is the rigid description by which they need to judge the image. The question of interpretation and the negative impact of imposed subject description came forward as limiting the true form of artistic interpretation. A majestic lion is ruined by a twig in front of his eye, and that is such a pity. Personally, I would remove the twig, blow it up to 2 meters and hang it on my wall!

At VisLit we try to be better at what we do, but first we ask the question "what were you wanting to do?" Then and only then do we offer criticism in achieving that result.

At our next meeting we will embark on something different. This time the challenge comes from Chris, and we will attempt to look at another impossible topic - 'abstract'. Then we will attempt to make it better! Really? How could abstract ever be right or wrong? Well what can I say - it's abstract! But we will certainly run out of time again trying to improve our craft. ~ Helder ~



How would you promote HPS to someone wanting to join


By inviting them to a meeting to experience a friendly, non-threatening atmosphere where everyone is welcome to share their interest in our amazing and creative hobby.
