So out of adversity comes opportunity. When we were initially locked down for 3 weeks, I decided to use this time effectively to feel some sense of achievement after home confinement. I enrolled for 2 courses on Udemy for Affinity Serif. The first course was 85 videos plus notes at a cost of R220.00 This gave me great tools and ideas to rework some of my old photographs. Covered in the course was different styles of photo editing, to name but a few:

♦ Cropping
 ♦ High key
 ♦ Low key
 ♦ Split toning
 ♦ Monotones

So, although we can't get out to photograph, this provides a good opportunity to rework some of your old pics which you maybe never thought were very good. This styling is often what gives the WOW factor, which is spoken about in judging.

Which brings me to judging in general - another way to improve your photography.

When Bernard and I did the judging guidelines, I purposefully placed the different criteria for judging on separate pages (pages 2-6) so that they could be printed out and one could have them next to you and refer to them when judging. This lockdown is a great opportunity for those who are nervous of judging at club, to practice. On-line judging has great advantages:

- 1. One has more time to view the photographs and analyze them
- 2. Nobody knows what you have scored
- 3. If the external judge crits the pic (which I hope they will do on-line), you can evaluate your opinion against theirs
- 4. Judging is a great tool to exercise the brain into taking the different elements, exposures and lighting etc, etc, into account. If you do this often enough the brain will get used to looking for these different elements and use them when photographing.



Talking about judging - we have positive response from outside judges, but we are still looking for judges from our own members. Please feel free to volunteer (Denise Whiteford 082 464 0816)


