Thoughts on Set Subject for March - Shadows

The full list of set subjects, together with descriptions, was issued a couple of weeks ago. The set subject for March was described by the author thus:

"March: Shadows

A shadow is the result of the relationship between the subject's location and the direction of the light source. With front light, the shadow falls behind the subject. When side lit, it appears on the opposite side that's lit.

Shadow photography is known for its capability to transform a plain image into something extraordinary. Shadows can serve as a tool to improve texture, balance, and contrast (with little effort).

We all know that light and shadow is very important in virtually all photography. But clearly, "Shadow Photography" does not include all photographs!

The article referenced above certainly raises some interesting points. I note that it mentions adding and subtracting shadows using Photoshop. Does this have a place in "Shadow Photography? Maybe. But certainly, the enhancement of image shadows is something that Photoshop will definitely be used for.

Another interesting topic: the article notes that silhouettes and shadows are not the same thing, implying, perhaps, that a silhouette is not a shadow photograph. However,



there are many other references out there that include silhouettes in the shadow photography genre. In addition, the image of the gent in the library presented in the article, I would say, is more a silhouette than a normal shadow photograph.

Here, once again, I think that a silhouette is a special case of shadow photography, and cannot be excluded.

At the other end of the scale, there is the question of chiaroscuro. Chiaroscuro is the artists' term for strong contrast of light and dark values in an art work. A discussion around the application of this to photography is given in Point 5 of:

The author gives two references to art-works (copies of which I provide here), Johannes Vermeer's "The Milkmaid", and Joeseph Wright of Derby's "The Orrery".



In these two images clearly, the shadows play a large part.

In the case of The Milkmaid however, I would say that a photograph that looks like this would not be considered as being in the genre of "shadow photography".

But that is just my opinion of course. Your opinion may differ.



On the other hand, a photo that looks like The Orrery, clearly would be considered shadow photography.

And it is clear that the centre of interest is not the shadows.

So, it seems that the shadow itself does not have to be the centre of interest.

All based on my opinion of course.

So, what exactly is "Shadow Photography"?

Adobe's conclusion is that: "Any photo that uses shadows as a prominent part of the composition — to enhance the contrast of a subject or as the subject itself — is shadow photography."

While I was busy reviewing this subject, David Osborne issued an email containing his photograph "Wrest Park". I was immediately struck by the image; and then thought: "Is this a shadow photograph?" I found I was in two minds about this one!

I contacted David and asked if he considered this to fall into the genre "Shadow Photography", and could I have his permission to use this image in our monthly internal

newsletter. His reply included the comment:

"Regarding 'Shadow Photography', I can't help much – not heard the expression. I just like to make good tonal BW images."

So, I remain undecided as to whether or not I would categorize this one as a shadow photograph.



Let's look at some other examples obtained from the internet:



This is one that we see quite often.


Here the centre of interest is clearly the shadow. Without the shadow there would be a lesser storey.

It's a pity the ring isn't more like the size of a wedding band; this slightly dulls the storey.

This is clearly an image with a bit of a giggle to it. The shadow is obviously essential, and thus it has to fit the genre!

Some work went into the photography and/or the Photoshop. A good effort





In this image, there is not much shadow. But that bit of shadow certainly turns a drab image into something better.

We've all seen these pictures with cats, dogs, camels and people. Some of them are really impressive!

In this particular case, it looks as though the shadow of the cat's tail might have been truncated or cropped off. And it would be fairly easy to rectify that impression using Photoshop.





This is all about the shadows. Easily complies with the genre.

However, some judge is bound to point out that he should not be walking out of the picture, but into it! Just kidding!

A well seen image. The shadows are essential and make the photo.





The centre of interest is the shadow. The background confirms that this tree is on the beach. The tree's shadow suggests that this is a tropical beach.



I'm not quite sure where I found this image, but isn't it a beauty?

Here we have chiaroscuro aplenty! We have an obvious shadow, and the additional headroom tells one more about the stairway. Easily passes the genre definition.

Conclusion:

So, at the end of the day, where would I say that the limits of our current genre are? I would say that it is up to the opinion of the individual author to decide if his or her image complies with this category. The only reason for outright disqualification would be if there is no sign of any shadow.

EDITOR'S COMMENT

At the normal HPS meeting in November, Nettie asked us to think about why we follow this hobby, and consider how we may be able to assist with the running/expansion of the club. Some of her concerns were further elaborated in her email letter towards the end of November. Based on this, and subsequent discussions with Mari, I decided to offer to take on the responsibility for this monthly HPS Newsletter.

As far as the first part of the question is concerned, (why I follow this hobby), I have often thought about this matter. Why did I get into photography in the first place? It started with our family Box Brownie camera. My parents used to remark that photos taken by me usually seemed to look better than the others, although I was just doing what mother told me — "If you cut off someone's feet, cut them off at their waist". This moderate success tends to make one feel as though one has an aptitude for the job!

Years later they bought me a magic little Halina 35X, which had all of the attributes of a "modern" camera of the day. I first joined a photographic club back in 1978, after I was able to afford a proper SLR camera. This started my fascination with photographic

images. However, after a few years, it also killed the enjoyment for me. I did slide work, and every time I looked through the viewfinder, I started to see power lines and discarded coke tins. Things that ruined the view and, about which, little could usually be done. I was no longer enjoying my photography! So, I gave it up and started with homecomputing/programming as a hobby instead.

In 2000 I was transferred to India; and we bought our first digital camera in order to email pictures home to the family. That camera was not too good. The following year, after doing some homework, I bought a good reasonably priced point-and-shoot digital camera. This, together with my interest in digital manipulation, reignited the photography urge once more. In 2002, after returning to RSA, I went searching for a digital camera club. There were none; except for some purely web-based versions. I joined a couple of these, but always found that I longed for the more personal nature of the physical meetings. It just so happened that one of the first PSSA camera clubs to go digital was F-Stop, right in my home town of Kempton Park! By that time (mid 2005) I already owned my first DSLR, the wonderful Konika-Minolta Dynax 7D. From then on, I was hooked again! And now I was able to clone out powerlines and discarded coke tins using The Gimp!

The email from Nettie, mentioned in the first paragraph, arrived on 25 November. On that same day, one of the photographer/writers, whose web-site I visit regularly (Guy Tal), published an article that helped to clarify my feelings on why I practice photography. His article "On Motivation, Creativity, and Personal Expression" highlights the differences between intrinsic and extrinsic forces in photography; and the conflict that exists as a result of these two positions not being compatible in many ways. It is definitely clear to me that I am primarily motivated by intrinsic forces. I make (photograph/edit) images because I find pleasure in the relaxation it gives to the soul. I also sometimes avoid external conflict by not publishing some of my more "way-out" images at the club, because I feel the judges might not appreciate what I have created.

But the external results are also important to me. During the Covid shutdown I sorely missed physical meetings, although I did find the period very creative from the image editing point of view.

The article also answers some of the questions I've asked myself over the years. Why I don't enter salons, or seek PSSA honours of some sort? I'm not interested. I guess I'm scared that any negative criticism may impact the pleasure I get out of making images that please me! I need an audience; yes. But I don't need to compare my work with the rest of the world. With the club, I have at least had some control over the likely outcomes by virtue of being acquainted with my audience.


