17 Jan. 2007 90.0S,90.0W

We have found our last treasure on Antarctica ... the Geographic South Pole, 90°S!

It snowed lightly all the time when we were skiing. At 89°54.5' (5.5nm away) the clouds lifted and we could see the buildings of the US Amundsen-Scott South Pole station. We first went past the ALE cache to get food, because we ran out of food and then went for the Pole. We arrived 15h40 Chilean time. The SP station manager waited for us at the Pole and gave us a friendly welcome. He invited us in for coffee and cookies. It was so strange to sit on a chair! We may also use the bathroom for the time that we are here. Thank you to them. Correne

Liewe familie, vriende en belangstellendes / Dear All

Dit gaan lekker wees om weer Afrikaans rondom my te hoor. Net 'n laaste woord van my.

Just a few words to explain what is at the South Pole. In the first place, the Geographic South Pole, 90° South, the southern end of the axis of the earth. The pole with the golden top on the picture marks this spot.

The pole with the silver ball that you have seen in a previous picture when we arrived at the Pole is the Ceremonial South Pole. This year this pole was placed 3 meters away from the 90° pole. When I was at the SP in 2001 it was 30 meters away.

The flags are of those countries that have science stations on Antarctica.

Then there is the American science station. You see the new, big building in the background of the pictures. At the moment there are 262 people - scientists and builders working there in the summer season. In winter about 40 people.

What a privilege I had to be on Antarctica for 60 days. Thank you to everybody for your support and interest - my family, husband, friends, gear sponsors, known and unknown people. To Andrew Gerber, the first South African who has skied to the South Pole, Andy I lift my ski pole to you.

I am grateful to God for the opportunity that He gave me to live my dream, and for the strength and the courage He gave me to cross my borders. I am just an ordinary woman with an extreme, extraordinary interest. It was not an easy path to reach the South Pole and I am not only talking here about the actual walking and skiing. For 5 years I have been dreaming and planning and living to do this. For two and a half years I applied for financial sponsorships. Nobody believed in me as a woman, but... I believed I in myself! Don't let other people set your borders. You are capable of doing more than you think. We all have dreams, things we want to do, 'South Poles' we want to reach. No matter how small or impossible they look to other people, they are important to you. Go for it!

(This was Correne's second expedition to the South Pole – she and two ladies started out on the 25^{th} November 2006, with no hair-washing until 17^{th} January 2007!)

We reached South Georgia in the South Atlantic yesterday morning after a 2 days and 3 nights crossing. The ship is warm and comfortable with plenty to do in the way of films, talks, etc. Out on the deck is the only place to watch the accompanying wandering albatross and other creatures of the ocean (whales, dolphins). We have had many Zodiac landings - at the Falklands we were at New and Carcass islands. We spent a beautiful sunny morning at Port Stanley.

The wild life is magnificent and we have seen plenty. After S Georgia we are moving South to the Antarctic Peninsula for some ice. I am pleased with my photos and everything is working well and so am I! I think of all of you.

THE LEICA FREEDOM TRAIN

I carry my Leica camera a bit more proudly these days. The reason? A story I had never heard before - a tale of courage, integrity and humility that is only now coming to light, some 70 years after the fact. The Leica is the pioneer 35mm camera. From a nitpicking point of view, it wasn't the very first still camera to use 35mm movie film, but it was the first to be widely publicized and successfully marketed. It created the "candid camera" boom of the 1930s.

It is a German product - precise, minimalist, utterly efficient. Behind its worldwide acceptance as a creative tool was a family-owned, socially oriented firm that, during the Nazi era, acted with uncommon grace, generosity and modesty.

E. Leitz Inc., designer and manufacturer of Germany's most famous photographic product, saved its Jews. And Ernst Leitz II, the steely-eyed Protestant patriarch who headed the closely held firm as the Holocaust loomed across Europe, acted in such a way as to earn the title, "the photography industry's Schindler."

As George Gilbert, a veteran writer on topics photographic, told the story at last week's convention of the Leica Historical Society of America in Portland, Oregon, Leitz Inc., founded in Wetzlar in 1869, had a tradition of enlightened behavior toward its workers. Pensions, sick leave, health insurance - all were instituted early on at Leitz, which depended for its work force upon generations of skilled employees - many of whom were Jewish.

The 'Leica Freedom Train'

As soon as Adolf Hitler was named chancellor of Germany in 1933, Ernst Leitz II began receiving frantic calls from Jewish associates, asking for his help in getting them and their families out of the country. As Christians, Leitz and his family were immune to Nazi Germany's Nuremberg laws, which restricted the movement of Jews and limited their professional activities. To help his Jewish workers and colleagues, Leitz quietly established what has become known among historians of the Holocaust as "the Leica Freedom Train," a covert means of allowing Jews to leave Germany in the guise of Leitz employees being assigned overseas. Employees, retailers, family members, even friends of family members were "assigned" to Leitz sales offices in France, Britain, Hong Kong and the United States.

Leitz's activities intensified after the Kristallnacht of November 1938, during which synagogues and Jewish shops were burned across Germany. Before long, German "employees" were disembarking from the ocean liner Bremen at a New York pier and making their way to the Manhattan office of Leitz Inc., where executives quickly found them jobs in the photographic industry. Each new arrival had around his or her neck the symbol of freedom - a new Leica.

The refugees were paid a stipend until they could find work. Out of this migration came designers, repair technicians, salespeople, marketers and writers for the photographic press. Keeping the story quiet The "Leica Freedom Train" was at its height in 1938 and early 1939, delivering groups of refugees to New York every few weeks. Then, with the invasion of Poland on 1 Sept. 1939, Germany closed its borders.

By that time, hundreds of endangered Jews had escaped to America, thanks to the Leitzes' efforts. How did Ernst Leitz II and his staff get away with it? Leitz Inc. was an internationally recognised brand that reflected credit on the newly resurgent Reich. The company produced range-finders and other optical systems for the German military. Also, the Nazi government desperately needed hard currency from abroad,

and Leitz's single biggest market for optical goods was the United States.

Even so, members of the Leitz family and firm suffered for their good works. A top executive, Alfred Turk, was jailed for working to help Jews and freed only after the payment of a large bribe.

Leitz's daughter, Elsie Kuhn-Leitz, was imprisoned by the Gestapo after she was caught at the border, helping Jewish women cross into Switzerland. She eventually was freed but endured rough treatment in the course of questioning. She also fell under suspicion when she attempted to improve the living conditions of 700 to 800 Ukrainian slave labourers, all of them women, who had been assigned to work in the plant during the 1940s.

(After the war, Kuhn-Leitz received numerous honors for her humanitarian efforts, among them the Officier d'Honneur des Palmes Académiques from France in 1965 and the Aristide Briand Medal from the European Academy in the 1970s.)

Why has no one told this story until now? According to the late Norman Lipton, a freelance writer and editor, the Leitz family wanted no publicity for its heroic efforts. Only after the last member of the Leitz family was dead did the "Leica Freedom Train" finally come to light.

It is now the subject of a book, "The Greatest Invention of the Leitz Family: The Leica Freedom Train" by Frank Dabba Smith, a California-born rabbi currently living in England. I was certain that one and all would be interested in this historic item that was little known and should certainly be brought to light.

 - the lectures will be suitable for everyone, it doesn't matter whether you are a film or digital worker an AV or print worker, or "just" a photographer, we have planned our programme to have as wide an appeal as possible.
- A midday photo shoot follows the lectures (which might sound odd to the golden hour photographers, but believe it or not photography underneath the vines is perfect at this time)
- Then a choice of workshops in the afternoon before heading out to take advantage of the late afternoon light across the vineyards.

- > The evenings are once again for entertainment with a Finger Supper on the opening night.
- ➤ A delegates' print exhibition will grace the walls of the hall and all congress delegates are invited to bring prints with them for exhibition.

On Monday the award winning AV's from PSSA's first "1 to 3" AV circuit (watch out for more information in Image) will be screened and this will be followed by supper offering time once again to socialise. Showtime will precede supper on the next three nights - during these sessions delegates will be able to show their own Audio-Visuals.

Wednesday is a free day - well part of it anyway - as we will be having High Tea at Boplaas farm later that afternoon.

We will be supplying info on photographic highlights with various options available, one of which will be the opportunity to do some aerial photography of the vineyards.

Friday will be a full PSSA day - with group discussions over lunch followed by the PSSA Forum which will give everyone the chance to air their views, complain, compliment and discuss photography and PSSA.

To end our enjoyable week we will be having a PSSA Country & Western evening - dress for the occasion in country attire and bring along your singing voices and dancing shoes.
