Strijdom van der Merwe

A self described "land artist", Strijdom van der Merwe uses materials he finds on site. Based in South Africa, his sculptural forms take shape in relation to the landscape. It is a process of working with the natural world, using sand, water, wood and rocks. He shapes these elements into geometrical forms that participate with their environment, continually changing until their final inevitable destruction.

He observes the fragility of beauty, while not lamenting its passing, he acknowledges the poignancy and pathos in its transience. What remains is a photographic image, a fragment of the imagination."

"While a visual record is materially all that is left, he also leaves us a reminder of the capacity, however feeble, of an individual to alter the universe by embracing the ceaseless changing of nature, actively contributing to it and, in so doing, modulating and beautifying the outcome."

Your Carriage Awaits

Lusso hops aboard the Orient Express to sample the spectacular Scottish splendor of The Royal Scotsman

There's a wonderful sense of freedom in leaving behind the concrete city skyscrapers and surrounding yourself with soaring mountains and calm lochs - something so definitive to the Highlands of Scotland as its history of warring clans.

Rumor has it that there's no better (or more glamorous!) way to experience the spectacularly diverse scenery of the Highlands than onboard The Royal Scotsman; we put this to the test.

In true Scottish splendor, we are piped aboard at Edinburgh's Waverley Station and start heading west on a rail journey often described as one of the world's most scenic. The warm welcome continues in the mahogany-paneled Observation Car where champagne is served and we marvel at the elegance of the Edwardian interior. I can already envision the many hours that will be spent here making acquaintances and admiring the views from the veranda in the exhilarating thrill of fresh air.



The city landscapes gradually fade away while we are personally introduced to the crew and given a rundown of the facilities onboard that include a small library. We are shown to our cabins and although we expect it to be intimate, it's surprisingly spacious with individually controlled heating, a ceiling fan and a full-length mirrored wardrobe. In fact, standing in the middle of the room, I found myself virtually surrounded in Highland beauty as the window reflects perfectly in the dressing table mirror! The attention to detail and personal service is striking as we find a handwritten card welcoming us on board, a pair of binoculars in the subtly scented drawers and a service call button that allows contact with the crew at any time of the day or night.

After unpacking we leisurely return to the Observation car to find a delightful display of freshly prepared sweet and savory snacks (including the best mini-scones in the world). Coffee and tea is served with remarkable ease while the steady rhythm of the rails run below and we marvel at the beautiful Ben Arthur, Loch Lomond and Rannoch Moor that fill the windows.

Late afternoon we return to our cabins to freshen up for dinner, which is a grand affair. The room gradually fills with glamour and excitement as guests mingle around canapés and the men steal the show in their colourful kilts and black tie, relaxing with wee dram in hand. A truly romantic occasion that even those without Scottish heritage can enjoy, by pre-arranging the hire of a traditional outfit to be delivered directly to the train.

Guests continue mingling through to the Raven and Victory dining rooms that allow for between 2 and 6 guests to be seated per table. Freshly baked bread rolls are served in the ambience of flickering candlelight, laughter and raised glasses to an appreciation of the finer things in life (it's not hard to imagine Sir Winston Churchill dining in the same carriage during its former glory days). A three-course gastronomic delight is served, each course presented with an accompanying wine, while outside the earlier views of lochs and mountains have now been replaced by wilder landscapes, set aglow in the firelight of the setting sun. It's hard to imagine a more stunning backdrop for dinner.

The entertainment continues after dessert in the Observation car where cheese platters and an infinite selection of drinks are served. Here we have the privilege of meeting local experts whose passion for Scottish history is evident in their vividly dramatic storytelling, display of authentic weaponry and performance of traditional Gaelic music. Absolutely mesmerising!

The next morning, a few of the more energetic souls go for an early morning stroll in the local town. Others (present company included) prefer a more leisurely start to the day, finding the freshly baked painau-chocolat and a cup of brewed coffee irresistible. The breakfast menu is extensive and offers the usual selection of fresh fruit and cereals as well as a grill and chef's special. In addition a selection of daily papers is available for those who still remember the real world.

With a slight jerk the train gradually picks up speed and we are swept away once again, this time towards Arisaig and past the breath-taking beauty of Loch Eil. We gaze upon mountains that disappear in woven shades of blue and grey, edge on the waterline of mirroring lochs, glide past waterfalls and streams trickling over boulder-strewn riverbeds and are stunned by the beauty of Glenfinnan and the famous 'Harry Potter' bridge. The splendor of it all leaves you feeling incredibly privileged and humble, standing in awe of the pure beauty you'd forgotten existed.

At Arisaig, the most western station of Scotland, we board a coach to the beautiful Morar Sands where we stop to dip our feet in the freezing water and walk along the lovely white stretches of sand. Hot and cold beverages are served from a picnic hamper and on our way back we see Britain's shortest river and glimpse the lovely Triagh Golf Course. Later that afternoon, we join a boat cruise on Loch Linnhe and enjoy some of the local produce (steaming mussels and salmon bites); stop to admire Neptune's staircase: A series of eight locks that connect Loch Ness to Loch Linnhe and has provided a safer inland route through Scotland since 1847; and briefly visit the Commando Memorial, built in memory of the Commandos training in Fort William during WWII. Heading back to the train, we wonder what cocktails will await us this time as we've quickly become accustomed to the lavishness of being welcomed back after each excursion with glasses of Pimm's, a Bloody Mary, or sparkling champagne. What a life! Someone's got to do it, right?

On our last day, we visit the spectacular Mount Stuart on the Isle of Bute. Best described as an architectural fantasy, its stunning and mysterious interiors are simply extraordinary! The amount of detail and thought incorporated in the design is staggering and testifies to one man's marvelous imagination, which is definitely worth a return visit another time.

Too soon our journey has to come to an end and we greet the crew and friends we've made onboard with glistening eyes, silently wishing that we could turn back the clock and start all over again. It was Marcel Proust who said: "The real voyage of discovery consists not in seeking new landscapes, but in having new eyes." The Royal Scotsman has done both, with an incomparable level of personal luxury service.

Dramatic effect was achieved when the sun filtered through in various places, and appropriate music was used to compliment this AV – well done Paddy! Neels Beyers was up next – he had four short AVs to show – two on 'Windsurfers', one on 'Smoke' and the last on 'Matjiesfontein'. All four AVs

were very creatively assembled, with 'different', but appropriate music resulting in the audience oohing and aahing, and also enjoying a laugh!.



Sharpening Your Creative Eye

For many of us, amateurs and professionals alike, producing creative photographs is a challenging objective. Snapshots just don't satisfy. We want to produce images that are expressive, imaginative, and original. But can our photographic creativity be developed—and expanded—and, if so, how?

Composition: Is the center of interest in the center? Should it be? Is every element in the frame needed? Is there an interesting relationship among the various objects in your photo? Is there a balance of picture elements? Don't forget to think vertically as well as horizontally. With popular subjects, like the Jefferson Memorial and cherry blossoms, avoiding clichés poses a special challenge.

I have closely observed many people taking pictures—my father William "Bill" Gottlieb (renowned photographer of jazz musicians), various colleagues, and many workshop students. From my observations--which include observing myself, I've concluded that virtually anvone can learn to be

creative...or I should say be more creative, since no one who has made it through childhood starts from ground zero. Creative ability, I strongly believe, is far less an inherent talent than an affirmative choice.

To choose to be creative means dedicating yourself, working with great intensity, and continually pushing yourself to improve. It means being open to new ways of seeing, and it helps if you master the tools of the trade, which runs counter to the way in which most people take pictures. Most find a subject that interests them, decide quickly how to approach it in terms of camera position, lens choice, etc., raise their camera, and--using auto-focus and program exposure mode--click the shutter. Then, they move on, in search of their next photographic quarry. Their energy is spent primarily on finding many subjects rather than exploring subjects carefully and with a fresh eye. Mind you, I've logged my share of miles searching for intriguing subjects, but that's no substitute for applying thought, imagination, and effort to the subjects you find. Even top pros will

fall into a rut unless they stay mentally sharp and demand the best of themselves.

My favorite method for sharpening creative vision is photographing the same theme or subject in many different ways. "Variations on a Theme" forces you to see beyond your initial, and generally conventional, instincts. You must take more time, look more carefully, and think more about the range of visual possibilities. I've done this with the Jefferson Memorial. I offer my pictures and captions as food for thought, but remember that being creative is not about seeing as someone else does; it's about seeing your own way...and pleasing yourself. So pick a subject that interests you some person, object, or place—and start shooting.

Get low, get high (left): Most pictures are made from five to six feet high - the height of most people's eyes. You get a predictable look and often one that doesn't put the emphasis where you want it. When I saw a yellow umbrella on a sunny day approaching the memorial, I climbed onto a balustrade to get this perspective.

Bend your neck (right): Look up, look down. Looking straight ahead is normal, which often results in a predictable visual feel. Here, I'm looking almost straight up using a fisheye lens.

Foreground/Background (left): Do foreground and/or background elements effectively "vibrate" with the main subject in terms of color, shape, contrast, texture, and content. Look for interesting juxtapositions, such as where the bend of a branch mimics the curve of the dome.

Shutter speed (right): Do you want movement frozen or blurred? To stop the motion of the feet, I shot at about 1/125th. Didn't get what you wanted (check LCD)? People will often go through the motions again just for you...and still maintain a spontaneous look.

Lens choice: Observe your subject with wide angle, normal, telephoto and panoramic eyes. How will different focal lengths change the relative sizes of elements in the picture? How will changing lenses affect the amount of foreground/background that's visible? How will it change depth of field? I used a pan camera here. Alternatively, shoot multiple images and digitally stitch them.

F stop & focal point (above left): Depending upon the f. stop, focal point, and lens you choose, you have tremendous control over what's in focus. Using a telephoto lens and shooting at f.22, I focused on tulips, with Jefferson—one-third-mile away—out of focus but recognizable.

Patience (above right): Patience often pays big rewards. From scouting, I knew a great shot was possible if I could get up high on ladder in the middle of a busy road that winds around the memorial. I waited two years for a rare moment when roads were almost vacant. (Reason: the Redskins were playing in the Super bowl). On my ladder, I waited half an hour for something to happen. A tourist came by and became the picture's focal point.

Details (left): Sometimes a part of the whole has strong graphic potential. Here's one of dozens of details of Jefferson I've shot.

Quality of Light (right): Does the light falling on your subject create the right "feel"? Would using fill-flash or a reflector reduce unflattering contrast? On this shot sunlight creates warm tones to the pillars, while the steps in the shade have cool tones.

More Creativity Stimulants:

Shoot, review, edit: Shoot plenty and then carefully observe your own work during the editing process so that sifting your wheat from your chaff is a learning experience.

Be ready for action: Keep your camera handy and be alert for great subject matter. Be prepared to react quickly when serendipity strikes.

Experiment: Try new ways of shooting. Play. Surprise yourself. Don't be afraid to make mistakes, which often lead to growth and sometimes yield wonderful images.

Stay motivated: Savor the fruits of your efforts by sharing your pictures with friends, making large prints for your wall, and/or creating an on-line photo album. Take a photo safari or a workshop.

Time of day: The golden light early and late in the day is everyone's favorite time to shoot, but wonderful images can be made at all times of day. This silhouette was shot in mid-afternoon; by taking a manual exposure reading of the sky, what's in the shade goes dark.

Study photographs you like:

Deconstruct favorite pictures to see what's possible and ponder how it was done. Ask yourself why you like the picture...and do you want to create images like that?

Know your equipment: The better you know your tools, the more varied your pictures will be and the more consistent the quality...plus, you'll spend less time fumbling when you need to get the shot. But becoming overwhelmed with mechanics can stifle the joy of the creative process, so take your learning at a comfortable, not a frustrating, pace.

There's more. Look for things that open your particular creative door, such as shooting with a friend or competing in your local camera club. One closing thought: let the approach and actions that sharpen your photographic creativity infuse greater creativity into other arenas of your life.
