SLOW PHOTOGRAPHY - Fun with a Kodak Brownie

Does anyone else get frustrated by the built in obsolescence of new gadgets, especially computers and other electronic must-haves and their software? Many things these days can't or won't be fixed; whole components have to be replaced. Do we just shrug and accept that we need to spend all this time (and money) just to keep functional? Ok, that's enough complaining (but I could go on!), but maybe this is why I still like using old cameras.

A friend recently showed me an old Kodak Brownie Six-20 model F camera which she was about to take to a charity shop. Would I like to have it? Its recent history was that it was found during a clear out of a wendy house where it had been lying for years. I was intrigued. The shutter worked, so I gave it a clean inside and out, including the lens, and started to think about using it.

I measured the focal length and diameter of the lens opening and worked out the aperture to be about fl1. From watching and listening I guessed the shutter speed to be about 1/60. This would mean that in bright conditions ISO 100 film would be a bit overexposed, but the exposure latitude of B&W film should be able to cope with that.

There is a note inside the camera which says, "Use Kodak 620 films. Shutter synchronized for flashbulbs class F or M". I don't have any flashbulbs, nor did I have 620 film; but I do have 120 film, which is freely available. 620 and 120 films are exactly the same width, the only difference being the spool diameter; 620 is smaller than 120. There was one 620 spool in the camera, so I was able to measure it and modify a 120 spool to fit. The next step, in the darkroom, was to unwind a roll of unexposed 120 film and rewind it onto the 620 spool. Sounds easy, but I was glad to have seen the description of how to do this at http://www.brownie-camera.com/respool.shtml, especially doing it for the first time in the dark.

Loading the 620 film into the Brownie was easy: the markings on the paper backing of 120 correspond to those on 620, so you can see the approaching frame in the red window on the back of the camera. With a negative size of almost 6 by 9cm you get 8 exposures on a roll of film. This could be the solution to image inflation!

This Brownie is more sophisticated than the basic model I remember using as a child. It has the following: bulb setting for timed exposures, a threaded tripod socket, and a shutter lock to prevent inadvertent release. Inside the camera there is a yellow filter and also a small auxiliary lens, each of which can be slid behind the main lens when needed. The auxiliary lens is used for closer focusing, approx 6 to 10 feet. There are 2 poles for flashbulb connection. The camera came in its original little canvas case with shoulder strap. Just asks to be taken for a walk!

I loaded the camera with the respooled Ilford Delta 100, and exposed all 8 frames on a mountain walk with friends one Sunday in February. The waist level viewfinders are tiny compared to those on other medium format cameras, but you don't have to focus, only compose. The viewfinder image is reversed L to R of course.

The results? Well they wouldn't get any PSSA awards, but I think they have a certain charm. The negatives might not stand much enlargement (I haven't tried) but the contact sheet withstands scrutiny and they are pics I like to go back to. For me it's quite a special record of the walk and the company, and it was fun.

Historical Notes

The first Brownie was made in 1900. The Six-20 model F described here was made in England between 1955 and 1957, according to the Brownie website. 620 film has not been produced since 1995, but respooled 620 is obtainable.

The film developer I use is Agfa Rodinal, which was originally patented on 27th January 1891, and is the oldest photographic product still available, according to Wikipaedia. 120 years old! Expensive? My latest, still unopened, 500ml bottle cost £13. Using 1:50 dilution this will do for 50 rolls of 120 film, or over 80 rolls of 35m film, and the shelf life is excellent.

PS I see that one of the missions of PSSA is "To embrace the future of photography while continually supporting the present". No mention of the past!

How to Install a Lightroom Plugin

Lightroom plugins provide fantastic versatility to an already great product. Before we delve any further into installing a plugin, I want to make sure that you know the difference between a preset and a plugin. Simply put, presets will perform exhaustive, repetitive tasks for you in Lightroom with the click of a button (like recording actions in Photoshop), while plugins will do tasks that Lightroom alone can't complete – think of them like add-ons.

1. To install a Lightroom plugin is rather straightforward. Simply find one of interest online and once downloaded, unzip the file to an area you can access easily (if it's zipped). If you have a lot

of plugins, it would help to organize them under one convenient folder – such as "Lightroom Plugins" – for easy access.

- 2. Read any instructions on installation that came with your plugin (usually under a "Readme" file). This will contain important information about the installation process that's specific to this plugin, and also how to use it. Also make sure to check the plugin creator's website as that will most likely have installation and usage instructions as well.
- Open up Lightroom and select File > Plug-in Manager. This is where all your active plugins are organized.
- 4. Navigate to your plugin location (where you just unzipped it to) and click Add Plugin. You can then come back to this menu at any time to disable a plugin if need be.
