- 2 projected images.


NOTE: Depending on our progress on the evening, it may be decided to cut reviewing short after the first image from all submitting members has been evaluated.

And from **Thomas Niemeyer** ... I read "Steve's Corner" notes. Informative, but anything related to Photoshop is too expensive. I had downloaded Elements 13 as a 30 day trial, but mixed up USD and Pound Sterling. The former just on the pain threshold and when I realized that the 3-digit figure was actually Pounds, I decided to do with my OLD version 6. Without proper instructions I never got to understand Layers.

6 month ago I had bought "PhotoFiltre Studio" for about 30 Euro. My web-guy uses it, so we can talk the same language. I now can do what I want with Layers, Transparency /Opacity etc. It still takes some time to prepare pictures for the my website (clocks). The final changes and settings my web-guy does. I will send a link when it is more complete.

Steve's Corner #2

Colour Spaces

Strangely, considering it was the black & white evening, a debate on colour space use started between some members at a recent meeting. This prompted some questions on just what is meant by sRGB and Adobe RGB 98 colour spaces. I am no expert but simply put a colour space is just a way of describing a gamut or range of colours. This is important to us because of the way different output devices handle colour.

There are three colour spaces that photographers commonly use. In increasing order of gamut size (the range of colours they support), these are sRGB, Adobe RGB 98 and ProPhoto. Our processing software can handle any of these and we commonly work in Adobe RGB 98 or ProPhoto while processing our images. When our images are displayed by non colour managed software applications or printed, the colour space used is typically close to the smaller sRGB colour space. This means that the colours used in our images must be reduced to fit those available in the smaller

colour space. When this is done automatically, the results can sometimes be less than pleasing and it is therefore far preferable to do the conversion ourselves, using our processing software. These applications will almost always do a better job of converting and we can further tweak the converted images if we aren't totally happy with the result.

Podcasts

Podcasts are like radio shows on the internet. There are many of them focusing on all sorts of topics, and photography is no different. There are different ways to consume podcasts; they almost always have an associated web site that offers textual notes adding to the audio of each episode as well as the episodes themselves in an audio format, usually MP3, via players embedded in their pages. They also allow the audio to be downloaded so that you can copy it to your computer, phone or audio player for listening at your convenience. Beyond this they publish their episodes via service like Apple's iTunes where you can subscribe to a podcast and episodes are automatically downloaded into the iTunes software on your computer. You can listen to it there or sync it to your phone, audio player or tablet for listening to offline; perhaps while commuting. Cars, buses or trains are places we may spend an hour or more in each day, making them perfect places to read or listen to our podcast content. The podcast web sites also give you access to earlier episodes that you can go back and listen to.

Furthermore, there are apps known as podcatchers, available for most desktop and mobile operating systems. These allow you to search for podcasts, subscribe to them and have episodes automatically downloaded for later consumption. iTunes behaves as a podcatcher as described above. If you use a smartphone or tablet, there are podcatcher apps you can use there. Some are free and included with the operating system on the device, for example the iOS operating system on your iPhone or iPad came with the Podcasts app. Many consider these built-in apps to be lacking in some ways and there are thus other podcatchers written by third parties available. For instance there is Overcast (https://overcast.fm/) a free podcast player for the iPhone, iPad and Apple Watch. If you are an Android user, there is a wide range of apps to choose from; ranging from free apps like Player FM (https://goo.gl/zNTpiL) and Podcast Addict (https://goo.gl/zNTpiL) and Podcast Addict (https://goo.gl/zNTpiL) and Podcast Republic (https://goo.gl/NUuHx), free apps with in app purchases like Podcast Republic (https://goo.gl/IIm38).

As for the podcasts themselves, there are a wide variety of photography related podcasts. You will probably find, as I did that there are some you really enjoy and others that you don't really like. The podcatcher apps let you search by topic to find podcasts that you can try out and subscribe to. Here are some of the podcasts that I enjoy.

- **Tips from the Top Floor** (http://tfttf.com) hosted by German photographer Chris Marquardt is the longest running photography podcast, with over 700 episodes, and focuses more on the creative aspects of photography than the gear as some podcasts do.
- The Candid Frame (http://ibarionex.net/thecandidframe/) hosted by Ibarionex Perillo author of Chasing the Light: Improving Your Photography with Available Light (Voices That

Matter) (http://goo.gl/t0lnzz) has each episode taking the format of an interview with a different photographer, focusing on their creative process and projects they have undertaken.

- The Digital Story (http://thedigitalstory.com) hosted by photographer and author Derrick Story publishes half hour episodes where photography news is covered along with one or two more in depth looks at some topics.
- **PhotoFocus** (http://photofocus.com/podcast/) has various hosts and publishes three (soon to be four) episodes per month. These take the form of interviews with photographers (two per episode) interspersed with question and answer shows in which the hosts answer questions that listeners have sent in.
- **Shutters Inc.** (http://www.shuttersincpodcast.com/) hosted by audio engineer and part-time phographer Bruce Williams, with photographer Glynn Lavender hails from Australia and takes the format of a chat between the two. This irreverent pair crack jokes and poke fun as they discuss photographic news items and news from their own lives.
- This Week in Photo (http://thisweekinphoto.com/category/twip-episodes/), also known as TWIP is another long running podcasts hosted by various photographers, some of whom also host their own podcasts. They cover the weeks news and usually pick one or two stories to discuss at length. TWIP is also the parent organisation behind a number of other, more focused podcasts, such as Street Focus hosted by Valerie Jardin, All About the Gear a video cast reviewing the latest gear and TWIP Talks an interview based show. All of these can be accessed via the TWIP web site.
- The Martin Bailey Photography Podcast

 (http://www.martinbaileyphotography.com/podcasts/) is hosted by Tokyo based British photographer Martin Bailey and covers largely nature and landscape topics. Martin runs several annual workshops around these themes. He has an annual one to photograph the snow monkeys and winter landscape of Hokkaido, was recently in Namibia and is planning a workshop in Iceland this year.
- **PhotoNetCast** (http://www.photonetcast.com/) is a podcast produced in a cooperation between several photography bloggers. The about page says, "Our idea is to stand out from the crowd and turn this podcast into a more relaxed and dynamic feature with a roundtable format. Instead of delivering the common "how to's" we intend to bring our own opinions and discuss the latest news going around in the photography world with a special focus on what is released by photography bloggers. This, of course, doesn't mean that we will not try to make it educational."



5 Basic Things You Will Need for Successful Night Photography

Much is made of technique when it comes to long exposure photography; after all, you have to have some idea of what you're doing and how to do it. But in this particular photographic niche, your gear matters almost as much. It matters not in the sense of being some sort of status symbol or commentary on your skill level as a photographer, but in the sense of allowing you to efficiently and effectively accomplish what you've set out to do under cover of dark: create beautiful long exposure images.

As you will see below, the basic list of items required to get the job done isn't extensive, so if you have been thinking about trying long exposure night photography you don't have many excuses to keep putting it off.

The Right Camera for the Job

This has absolutely nothing to do with what brand camera you use, nor whether you prefer mirrorless or DSLR. For successful night photography, the right • camera is one that possess the following features:

- Manual controls Aperture priority and shutter priority aren't going to do
 you much good when shooting in the dark; you will need to set exposure
 manually. Same goes for focusing odds are your camera's AF system will
 struggle mightily under such dark conditions. You can save yourself a lot time
 and hassle by using manual focus.
- Bulb mode Shutter speed maxes out at 30 or 60 seconds on most cameras.
 These times may be sufficient depending on what you're shooting, but in
 order to achieve very long exposures you will need a camera with bulb
 mode. That way you can make a 20 minute exposure should you ever want
 to.
- Raw files Being able to capture images as raw files will maximize image
 quality and minimize noise, two extremely important considerations when
 making long exposures. Additionally, raw files provide considerably more
 latitude during post processing.

Tripod

Not even the very best in-body image stabilization will facilitate successfully handholding your camera when doing long exposures. You need a tripod. Luckily, there are plenty of portable, lightweight, sturdy tripods available at reasonable prices. This is the type of tripod to choose if you plan on doing a lot of walking/hiking as part of your night photography excursions. Keep in mind, though, that tripods do have weight limit specifications, so if your camera/lens combo is especially heavy you'll need to choose a tripod capable of supporting it with no problem.

Remote Shutter Release

Long exposure photography requires a stable camera even slight vibrations can cause blurry images. A tripod, of course, is your first line of defense against camera shake, but you can implement a further safeguard by using a remote shutter release which will keep you from having to touch the camera once you're ready to shoot. In addition to being relatively inexpensive, most remote shutter release models work in bulb mode and allow you to shoot at intervals.

Extra Batteries

It's good to have an extra battery or two with you no matter when or where you're shooting, but nighttime photography ups the ante on this requirement. Why? Primarily because longer exposures eat up more of a battery. If you use Live View to compose and focus your shots (something you should definitely use if your camera has it, but it's not a necessity), that will drain your battery even more. In short, there's simply no good reason to not have spare batteries on hand.

Flashlight

There's nothing worse than fumbling around in darkness, especially when you're trying to get something done like taking a photo. To avoid wasted time and possible accidents, make sure to keep a small flashlight with you. You can use it when setting up your gear, rummaging through your camera bag, or changing settings on your camera. As a bonus, you might even put a flashlight to more creative use by using it for light painting.

There are certainly other items you could include in your long exposure/night photography kit: a neutral density filter, extra memory cards, gaffer tape, snacks, and something to drink. And, of course, your cellphone, which you will probably have with you in the first place. Your phone can actually serve multiple uses: a timer, a flashlight, a map, etc. While not necessarily vital to night photography, these things might serve to supplement the requirements listed above to help make your outing more fun and more successful.

Well written. Just a bit of info from Nikon. Nikon recommends turning off the stabilisation on its VRII lenses when in Bulb mode when you have a very stable tripod. The manufacturer says (sorry from memory) something akin to the point electronic stabilisation generates its own micro-movement for stabilising the lens/camera body as a form of dampening. Hence for bulb length exposures turn off the stabilisation and just rely on your tripod and the other aspects for ensuring stability mentioned in the article.

According to <u>the Irish Times</u>, the Irish photographer, <u>Kevin Abosch</u>, sold one of the three prints of his photograph to a European businessman who showed interest in purchasing it during a visit to the photographer's Paris home.

The photograph sold for a non-negotiable €1m, making it Abosch's largest sale on a single image.

"I see commonalities between humans and potatoes that speak to our relationship as individuals within a collective species. Generally, the life of a harvested potato is violent and taken for granted. I use the potato as a proxy for the ontological study of the human experience," said the photographer.

The photograph was <u>taken in 2010</u>, when a batch of organic vegetables was delivered to his home. Abosch's other work includes photographs of celebrities such as Johnny Depp, Malala Yousafzai and Steven Spielberg and a series of portraits of people from Ireland.
