We're already looking forward to the scenes you'll capture next month. Until then, keep shooting, keep exploring, and keep chasing the light.








How to Photograph Your Winter Life - Even When It's Cold, Wet, and Moody

Cape Town's winters are something else. No snow, ok sometimes, but we get our own dramatic version: cold fronts rolling in off the Atlantic, sideways rain, grey-on-grey skies, and sunsets that disappear before dinner. It's enough to make any photographer want to curl up inside with a blanket and a mug of hot chocolate.

But here's the thing: winter holds *magic*, if you know where to look for it and how to prepare your camera (and your mindset).

Embrace the Cape Winter.

I had to learn to see Cape Town's winter through a new lens, literally. And now? I love the moodiness. The quiet moments when raindrops pattern the windows. Kids stomping through puddles in gumboots. Mist weaving around Devil's Peak in the early morning. There's a rhythm to winter that slows everything down, and makes space for more intentional, story-rich photography.

You might not *feel* like heading out when the rain's pelting your windows but trust me: **the best photos often come** when you least feel like taking them.

Get Ready Before You Shoot

Getting out the door is half the battle. Think of it like going for a run in the rain, it's all about the prep.

- Layer up. Cape Town's cold is damp and sneaky. Wear thermals, waterproof boots, and a proper raincoat.
- **Protect your gear.** Use a rain sleeve (or a ziplock bag + elastic bands if you're in a pinch). Keep a microfiber cloth in your pocket and a towel in your bag for surprise soakings.
- Bring spare batteries. Cold + moisture = faster battery drain.

Make the Weather Work for You

Overcast skies? A gift. Soft, even light = flattering portraits, gentle shadows, and a moody vibe perfect for storytelling.

Rain? Even better.

- Shoot through car windows for dreamy, rain-speckled frames.
- Use puddles for reflection shots that feel cinematic.
- Backlight raindrops using streetlights, car headlights, or flash—instant sparkle.

Find contrast. To make rain or mist visible, place your subject against a darker background—trees, buildings, or alleyways work great.

Stay Inspired Through Shorter Days

Yes, the daylight is limited. But that just means you don't have to wake up at 5 AM to catch golden hour. Lean into the early mornings and cozy afternoons for soft light and long shadows.

Winter is also the perfect time to:

- Start a personal photo project
- Explore new techniques
- Dive into online challenges or courses (the Click Community has loads of inspiration)

Create Indoors When It's Really Stormy.

Can't shoot outside? Your home is full of stories waiting to be told.

- Morning light on the kitchen table
- Steam curling off a hot drink
- Kids lounging in blankets or building forts
- Rain streaking down the windows



Study the light in your home. Watch how it shifts through the day—find that corner that glows at 3 PM or the window that catches shadows in just the right way.

Get creative. Try free lensing, self-portraits, or handheld LEDs. Don't fear high ISO, grain can add mood and texture if the emotion is there.

7 Rainy Day Photo Tips to Keep the Magic Going

- 1. **Keep Your Camera Dry:** Use a rain sleeve or DIY cover. Or just stay under cover, umbrellas and car windows are your friends.
- 2. Chase the Puddles: Reflections on sidewalks and streets are nature's mirrors.
- 3. Light Up the Raindrops: Use backlight (headlights, flash, or street lamps) to make the rain shimmer.
- 4. **Tell a Rainy Story**: Capture the feel of winter with details like umbrellas, rain jackets, foggy glass, and damp streets.
- 5. Make Mood Magic: Moody lighting is perfect for emotional portraits and quiet moments.
- 6. **Spot the Rainbow:** Rain plus sunshine? Look up' Cape Town delivers some stunning arcs.
- 7. **Go Full Storm Chaser (Safely)**: Want drama? Capture distant lightning or storm clouds with a tripod and a longer exposure. Just don't stand in the middle of it!

Final Thoughts

Cape Town winters may not be snowy postcard scenes, but they're just as photogenic, just in a moodier, more intimate way. Let the rain slow you down. Let the grey skies soften your light. Let the rhythm of the season pull you into stories you might not notice in summer's golden haze. You don't need perfect conditions to make beautiful images. Just show up, raincoat zipped and camera in hand. There's wonder waiting in the cold and the wet, you just must be brave enough to go find it.
